Handball Unites the World Dear Handball Friends,

We are delighted to welcome you to the 29th IHF Men's World Championship. This year, the men's flagship event will be staged in three countries – Croatia, Denmark and Norway – marking the first time in the competition's history that three hosts team up to deliver the best experience for all stakeholders.

Five cities in Croatia, Denmark and Norway will be hosting the dreams and hopes of the world's 32 best men's national teams, with the third edition of the world handball flagship competition to have a 32-team line-up.

In Croatia, matches will be organized in Zagreb, Varaždin and Poreč – three cities where handball is at the forefront, while in Denmark, we are returning to Herning, a city with plenty of tradition in handball. Norway, with its capital Oslo, will also make handball shine in the Unity Arena.

All three countries have plenty of experience in organizing high-profile events, with all arenas having been used in the past for major international handball competitions. While Croatia and Denmark have already hosted the IHF Men's World Championship in the past, Norway will be the co-host for the first time in history, also organizing the big final on 2 February.

In the 32-team line-up, all handball powerhouses are represented, with Denmark aiming for a historical fourth consecutive title, after sweeping their opponents in 2019, 2021 and 2023. Teams from five continents will take to the court, with 18 sides from Europe, five sides from Africa, four sides from Asia, three teams from South and Central America and two teams from North America and the Caribbean securing their tickets for Croatia/Denmark/Norway 2025.

One side, Guinea, will make their debut at the 2025 IHF Men's World Championship, while Italy will be returning after 28 years, qualifying for the second time in their history. Cuba, the NACHC Men's Handball Championship winners, are also due to play on the biggest stage of all for the first time since 2009, as well as Kuwait, who are returning after 16 years.

At this point, I want to express my gratitude to Croatia, Denmark and Norway and their Organizing Committees who took all the necessary measures to realise an unforgettable championship. I hope you will all enjoy your time in these beautiful countries.

Furthermore, I would like to thank the 32 teams, their National Federations and the Continental Confederations for their hard work that made their teams' dream to participate in a World Championship come true. We appreciate their commitment to the values of the sport, such as fair play, which I am confident they will showcase. My appreciation goes out to all parties involved, including but not limited to the spectators, fans, volunteers, referees and coaches, who will all contribute to the success of this prestigious event.

We look forward to a superb competition and wish all the players and teams health and luck. May the best team win!

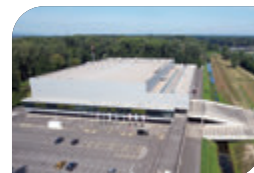

Opened in 2010, this arena has hosted numerous major tournaments. These include the Women's Euro in 2010 and 2020, the Men's Euro in 2014, the Men's World Championship in 2019, and the Women's World Championship in 2023.

Herning is a city in Denmark's Central Jutland Region and the administrative center of Herning Municipality. It has a population of 46,873, making it Denmark's 11th most populous urban area. First mentioned in 1579, Herning remained a village until around 1800. Its population grew rapidly as people settled in the area for its agricultural potential, typical of much of Denmark. This development turned Herning into a trade hub for the surrounding region.

Herning is renowned for its textile industry, which initially drove the local economy and expanded to the surrounding area. While textiles were once the dominant industry, Herning now has a diverse industrial base. It gained city status in 1913 and has twice been named Denmark's best city of the year, in 1965 and 2003.

Situated at an elevation of 40–55 meters, Herning lies in the temperate northern zone, with its low-lying landscape influenced by the Gulf Stream. Although it is not located near the sea or rivers, residents utilize nearby lakes for water supply and tourism. Herning's blend of history, industry, and natural surroundings make it a vital part of Denmark's cultural and economic fabric.

A Historic Championship of Collaboration and Responsibility

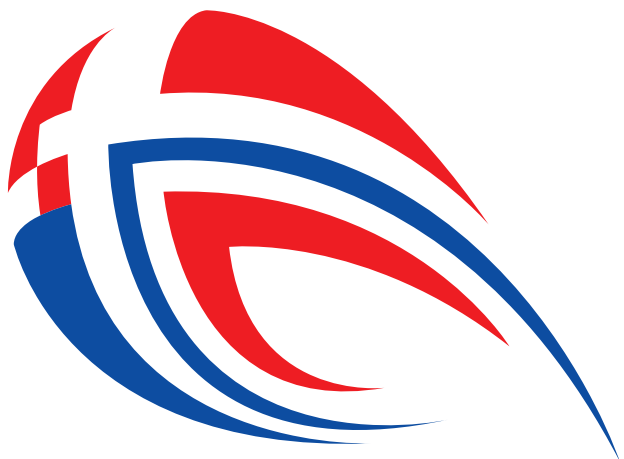

Medal Dreams: Germany Eyes a Return to the Podium

Germany's handball team is always considered a medal contender in major tournaments, and the 2025 World Championship is no exception. Ranked among the top five teams for the most medals won at World Championships, Germany's tally includes two golds, two silvers, and one bronze. However, it has been 18 years since they last stood on the podium at a World Championship, when they clinched gold as hosts in 2007. While they've come close in recent years, such as their fourth-place finish in 2019, they fell short in the semifinals against Norway and then lost the bronze medal match to France.

Germany's Bundesliga is one of Europe's strongest leagues, but a challenge for the national team is the prevalence of foreign players in top clubs like Magdeburg, Kiel, Flensburg, and Füchse Berlin. At the recent Paris Olympics, Germany secured silver, losing only twice—once to Croatia in the group stage and then to

Denmark in the final.

Germany's greatest strength lies in their goalkeepers, particularly Andreas Wolff. Their promising backcourt includes rising stars like Marko Grgić, Juri Knorr, Renars Uščins, and Julian Köster. For the 2025 World Championship in Croatia, Denmark, and Norway, Germany will rely on their traditionally solid defensive play. Interestingly, Germany will host the next two World Championships: solo in 2027 and jointly with France in 2029. As such, they are already building a team with these future events in mind.

Germany qualified for this World Championship as the third-best team from the previous European Championship, which they hosted. Their Icelandic coach, Alfred Gislason, faces a significant challenge.

»»» **Andreas Wolff**



At 33 years old, Andreas Wolff is regarded as one of the best goalkeepers in the world. Born in the small town of Euskirchen, he began playing handball in 1995 at a young age. His junior career spanned three lesser-known German clubs before making his senior debut with Kirchzell. He then moved to Großwallstadt, a club with two Champions Cup titles from 1979 and 1980. In 2013, Wolff joined Wetzlar, where he spent three seasons before transferring to Kiel in 2016. His first and only stint abroad was with Kielce in Poland, where he played for five seasons before returning to Kiel last year. Since his national team debut in 2013, Wolff has won every medal except one from the World Championship. His accolades include European gold in 2016, Olympic silver in 2024, and bronze in 2016. A World Championship medal is the only missing piece in his collection.

From Legends to New Beginnings: Czech Handball's 2025 Campaign

The Czech national team first appeared at the World Championship in 1995 in Iceland. This will be only their sixth appearance, with their best result being 8th place in their debut tournament. In the round of 16, they caused one of the biggest surprises by eliminating South Korea after extra time. However, they were defeated by Sweden in the quarterfinals (17:21) despite a strong fight.

Their last World Championship was in 2015. After a long absence, they return to the global stage. During the era of Czechoslovakia, the team achieved great success, winning one gold, two silver, and two bronze medals, placing them 9th overall in the medal standings. As successors to Czechoslovakia alongside Slovakia, the Czech Republic was quickly admitted to the IHF. How-

ever, they have not replicated the achievements of their predecessor, which was a World Champion and Olympic silver medalist.

Under Spanish coach Xavier Sabate, the Czech Republic aims to advance to the second round of the 2025 World Championship. The roster includes experienced goalkeeper Tomas Mrkva, who plays for Kiel, and key backcourt players Klima, Babak, and Kasperek, along with left wing Jakub Hrstka. They qualified for the World Championship by defeating Romania. After losing the first leg 31:30, they secured a convincing 29:20 victory at home.

»»» **Tomas Mrkva**



At 35, Tomas Mrkva will be one of the oldest goalkeepers at the 2025 World Championship. He began his career in Karvina before moving to Germany in 2016, first playing for Göppingen and then Kiel, where he currently plays. Early in his career, Mrkva wore jersey number 1, but he switched to number 16 after joining the Bundesliga.

Last season, Mrkva helped Kiel secure third place in the Champions League, delivering 15 saves in the bronze medal match against Magdeburg. Earlier in the tournament, they lost to Barcelona in the semifinals. This season, Mrkva shares playing time at Kiel with Andreas Wolff and hopes to lead the club to another Champions League Final Four appearance.

From Past Triumphs to New Challenges: Poland's 2025 Journey

Poland will compete in their 18th World Championship, having won four medals: one silver and three bronze. Many still consider them the favorites for gold at the 2007 World Championship in Germany. Under coach Bogdan Wenta, they assembled a stellar team featuring Szymal, Lijewski, Tkaczyk, Bielecki, and Jurecki. They reached the final but were defeated by the hosts, Germany.

Poland's first golden era in World Championship history occurred in the late 1970s. They finished fourth in 1974 and won their first bronze in 1982 in Germany, defeating Denmark in the third-place match. At the time, Wenta, who would later become their coach, was a key player. During this period, they also earned an Olympic bronze in Montreal in 1976.

However, a long drought followed, as Poland failed to qualify for five consecutive World Championships from 1993 to 2003. They returned in Portugal in 2003, advancing to the sec-

ond round but missing the 2005 tournament in Tunisia. Their comeback in 2007 was spectacular, leading to a silver medal. Poland added bronze medals in 2009 in Croatia and 2015 in Doha, Qatar, marking their last podium finish. It has now been nearly a decade since Poland reached the podium. Their most notable performance in this period was a semifinal appearance at the 2016 Rio Olympics, where they finished fourth.

At the 2025 World Championship, Poland's primary goal is to advance from the group stage. The team benefits from two Champions League clubs—Kielce and Wisła—but the national team's results have been underwhelming. They secured qualification by defeating Slovakia in a playoff, overcoming a 28:29 home loss with a 33:25 away victory.

Standing at 207 cm, is one of the tallest pivots in the world. He began his career with Wisła, making his senior debut at 17 against Azoty, where he scored his first goal in a 28:20 victory. After Wisła, Syprzak joined Barcelona and later moved to PSG. At these clubs, he played alongside some of the greatest handball players, such as Entrerriós, Sigurðsson, Lazarov, Tomas, Sarmiento, Jicha, Rivera, Mem, Pálmarrsson, Hansen, Remili, Krištopans, and the Karabatić brothers. Notably, Syprzak left Barcelona one year before they won the Champions League, and although he reached the Final Four three times with PSG, he never lifted the trophy. Syprzak has been a mainstay for Poland since 2011 and was part of the squad that won bronze at the 2015 World Championship in Doha. His towering presence and experience make him a critical player for Poland in their quest for success.

Switzerland's Handball Revival: Aiming for Recognition in 2025

Remarkably, Switzerland's handball team has played in only one World Championship over the past 30 years. Their last appearance was in 2021 in Egypt, where they finished 16th. They advanced from the group stage as the third-placed team, behind France and Norway and ahead of Austria. In the second round, they managed victories against Algeria and Iceland but failed to reach the quarterfinals. Switzerland's best result was a fourth-place finish at the 1954 World Championship in Sweden. That same year, their football team excelled at the World Cup as hosts, reaching the quarterfinals before losing to Austria (5:7). In 1954, the World Championship featured just six teams, with Switzerland losing the bronze medal match to Czechoslovakia (11:24).

Today, Swiss handball is fighting for its place under the sun, and they will be overjoyed if they make it past

the first round. They will not have head coach Andy Schmida or Manuel Zhender in their ranks, as he injured his knee shortly before the World Championship. His brother, Samuel, who plays in Lemgo, is present. In Germany, the team also includes goalkeeper Portner (Magdeburg), Rubin and Laube (Stuttgart), and Gerbl (Hannover). Historically, Swiss handball has produced notable figures such as Marc Baumgartner and Arno Ehret. Over the years, many coaches from the former Yugoslavia, including Goran Perkovic, Pero Janjić, and Sead Hasanefendić, have also left their mark on Swiss handball.

Switzerland qualified for this World Championship thanks to a special IHF invitation after losing in the playoffs to Slovenia.

Last season, he was involved in a doping scandal, which turned out to be false, and he continued to play at a high level. It has been 11 years since his debut for Switzerland against Italy when he was just 20 years old.

He is characterized by speed, exceptional focus, and excellent preparation for every opponent.

How have you been managing the demanding schedule over the past few years, especially with the added games from the Olympics last year, which greatly increased the overall game tally?

This is the first time I've experienced an Olympic season, so it's hard to say. Could you share your thoughts on your group in the 2025 World Championship and the potential opponents in the Main Round? Do you have any expectations for the other three Main Round groups?

I think there are some underrated teams. We've seen Italy hold their own against Spain, which was surprising in many ways. But it also shows that Italian handball players are doing well. I don't know much about Algeria, but Tunisia also has a solid team that plays good handball. So, we're not going into these games expecting easy wins. These will be tough matches that require full focus to secure maximum points. For the other group in Denmark, I expect Germany to win it. Then there'll be a close battle for second and third place. All the teams are strong and can deliver a high level on their day. So, it'll be a tough group to cross over with.

Unstoppable Denmark: Rewriting Handball History

Denmark's men's handball team aims to achieve the impossible: win their fourth consecutive World Championship title. Since 2019, they have been unbeatable in World Championship finals, defeating Norway (31:22), Sweden (26:24), and France (34:29) in the last three tournaments. Denmark currently ranks fourth in the total number of gold medals won, with three, and they have a chance to match Romania and Sweden if they claim their fourth. Regardless of the 2025 outcome, France will remain on top with six golds. Overall, Denmark has won seven medals, five fewer than France and Sweden.

Their first semifinal appearance was in 1958, where they finished fourth. They won their first medal in 1967, claiming silver in Sweden after losing the final to Czechoslovakia. It took decades for them to return to the podium, finally securing bronze in Tunisia in 2005. Since 2007, they have failed to medal only three times: in 2009 (Croatia), 2015 (Qatar),

and 2017 (France). Denmark has also gained recognition as a host nation. They first hosted the championship in 1978 when West Germany, led by Croatian coach Vlado Stenzel, won the title. Denmark co-hosted with Germany in 2019 and will co-host with Croatia and Norway in 2025, as well as with Iceland and Norway in 2031.

Many Danish players play key roles in Europe's strongest clubs. Gisdal represents Füchse Berlin, Jakobsen, Møller, Kirkeløkke, Jørgensen, and Pytlick are in Flensburg, Saugstrup plays for Magdeburg, Nielsen for Barcelona, and Madsen for Kiel. This will be Denmark's first major tournament without Mikkel Hansen, who retired from international play after the Paris Olympics. Danish clubs, such as Aalborg, have also become European powerhouses, reaching the Champions League final in 2021 and 2024.

Mathias Gidsel is widely regarded as one of the best right backs in the world. He has played for only two clubs in his career, starting with GOG before transferring to Füchse Berlin in 2022. Gidsel made his debut for Denmark on November 7, 2020, against Finland and quickly established himself as one of the team's top players and scorers at the 2021 World Championship in Egypt, where he was named the tournament's best right back.

Gidsel's accolades include Olympic silver in Tokyo, World Championship gold in 2021 and 2023, and European bronze in 2022. He was named MVP of the 2020 Tokyo Olympics and the 2023 World Championship in Sweden and Poland. With 75 appearances and 420 goals for Denmark, Gidsel is already one of their all-time greats. In 2022, he became the third Danish player to be named World Handball Player of the Year.

Italy's Handball Renaissance: Back on the World Stage

Italy enters the World Championship as a team currently making waves. They earned their spot by defeating Montenegro in the playoffs with two wins: 32:26 at home and 34:32 away. This will be Italy's second appearance at the World Championship, with their first in Japan in 1997. Back then, they were coached by Croatian legend Lino Červar, who later led Croatia to World and Olympic gold. Under Červar, Italy finished 18th, leaving a strong impression with a draw against Norway (19:19) and narrow losses to Sweden and France. They also secured a group-stage win over Argentina. Italy is still searching for its first win against a European team at the World Championship, an achievement unlikely to happen in the first round of 2025, as Denmark is too strong, and the other opponents

are from Africa.

Italy plays a fast-paced style and features several notable players, such as Helmersson (Coburg), Mengon (Eisenach), and Ebner (Leipzig), who compete professionally. Many players of Yugoslav origin have represented Italy, including Tin Tokić, Damir Opalić, Zaim Kobilica, and Denis Radovčić. Handball remains low in popularity in Italy compared to football, volleyball, basketball, and water polo, where Italy boasts numerous medals. The handball league is improving but remains financially limited, making it difficult to attract major stars.

Italy is coached by Ricardo Trillini.

That year, he was named Goalkeeper of the Month in November.

His strong performances led to a move to Hannover, where he spent four seasons before joining Leipzig in 2023. With dual citizenship thanks to his Italian mother, Ebner debuted for Italy in 2017 against Greece. He is in a relationship with Nicole Roth, a fellow goalkeeper who plays for Thüringen. At Leipzig, Ebner shares goalkeeping duties with Norwegian Kristian Sæverås.

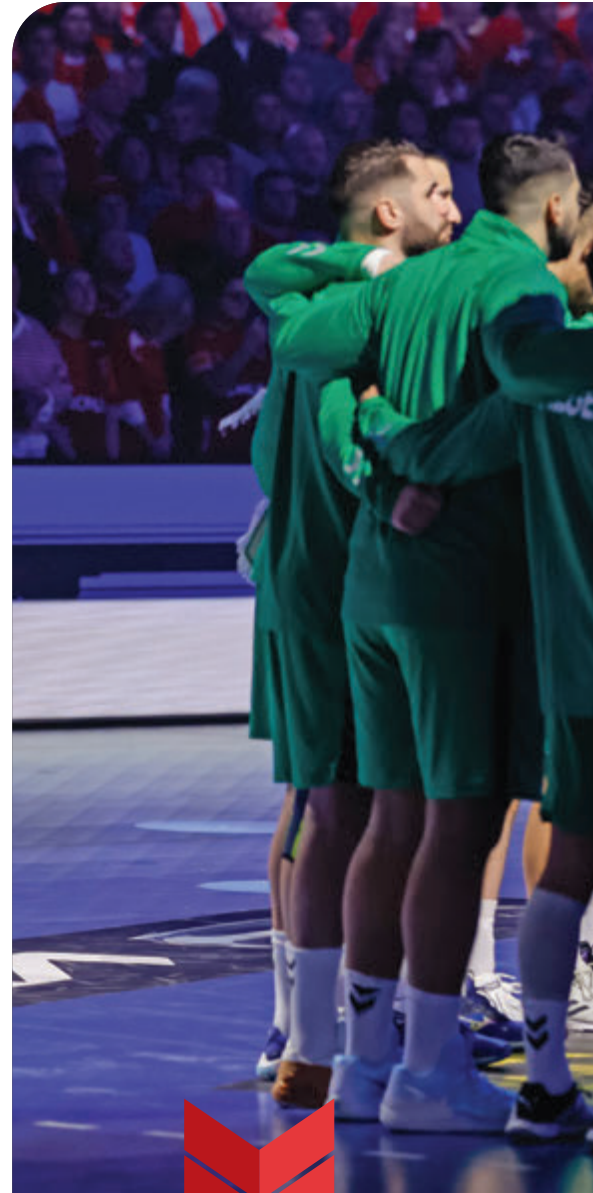

From African Powerhouse to Global Stage: Algeria's World Cup Journey

Algeria is a handball powerhouse in Africa and will make their 17th appearance at the World Championship in 2025. While they boast significant experience, their World Championship results have been modest. Their best finish was 13th in 2001 in France, where they advanced to the Round of 16 after defeating Kuwait and Brazil and drawing against Argentina. They were eventually eliminated by Egypt (21:24).

Algeria debuted at the World Championship in 1974, achieving their first victory in 1995 by shocking Denmark. That year, they reached the Round of 16 but fell to Sweden. Algeria has also competed in the Olympics four times, most recently in Atlanta in 1996, where they finished 10th. In the African Championship, Algeria has won a remarkable 20 medals, including seven golds. Alongside Tunisia and Egypt, they are one of the only African nations to claim the continental title.

At the last African Championship, Algeria finished as runners-up to Egypt, securing their place at the World Championship. Their most recent African title came in 2014, when they defeated Tunisia in the final. Algeria has hosted the African Championship four times and remains the record-holder for consecutive titles, winning five in a row. The team is coached by Farouk Dehili. Key players include Mustapha Hadj Sadok, who was named the best center back at the last African Championship. He has played for clubs like Beşiktaş and Winterthur and currently represents Kuwait's Al-Nasr. Many Algerian players also compete in France, including Hichem Daoud (Limoges) and Ayoub Abdi (Nantes). Khalifa Ghedbane, a seasoned goalkeeper with Champions League experience at Vardar, Pelister, and Dinamo Bucharest, is another standout.

Abdi debuted for the Algerian national team in 2016 and has since earned over 60 caps, scoring more than 200 goals. He was instrumental in Algeria's silver medal run at the last African Championship. At 27 years old and standing 197 cm tall, Abdi is a key player, known for his powerful shots and presence on the court.

Tunisia's Handball Legacy: Chasing Glory in 2025

Tunisia, alongside Egypt, is one of Africa's most successful handball teams in World Championship history. They are the second African team to reach the semifinals, following Egypt in 2001. Tunisia's historic achievement came in 2005, when they hosted the tournament under Croatian coach Sead Hasanefendić. Playing outstanding handball, Tunisia topped their first-round group without a loss, drawing against France (26:26) and defeating Denmark. In the second round, they continued their dominance, beating the Czech Republic and Russia to top their group and reach the semifinals. However, Tunisia fell to Spain in front of 14,000 fans in Rades and lost the bronze medal match to France. That remarkable squad included players like Tej, Hmam, Seboui, Ben Aziza, and Meganhem.

Tunisia first participated in the World Championship in 1967, finishing 15th. Since 1995, they have been regular

participants. While they placed 25th in the last two editions, they remain far from their semifinal run in 2005.

Tunisia has won the African Championship 10 times, most recently in 2018. They hold the record for the most African titles (10) and total medals (25). However, Egypt could surpass Tunisia's record if they win a fourth consecutive title in 2026. Tunisia has hosted the African Championship five times, including the inaugural edition in 1974, winning medals on each occasion. They have also competed in four Olympic Games, though without notable results.

Tunisia is coached by legendary French player Patrick Cazal. They qualified for the WC as the bronze medalists of the last African Championship.

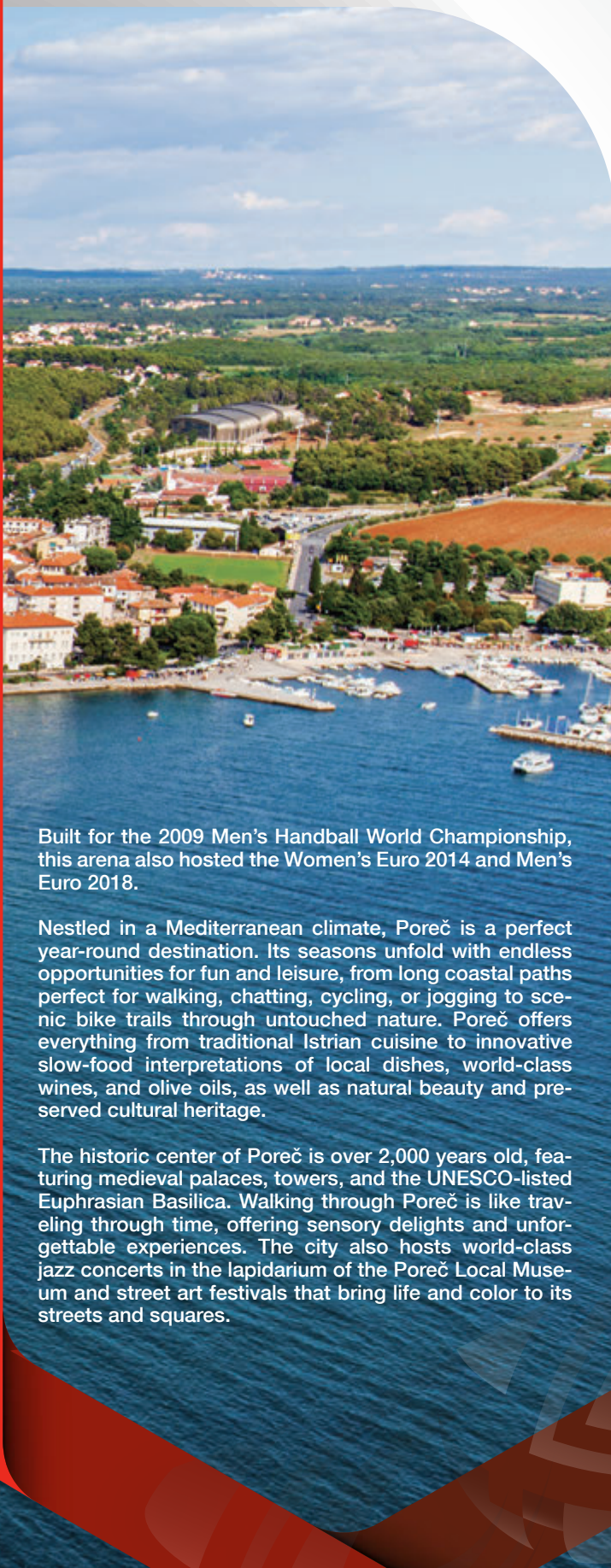

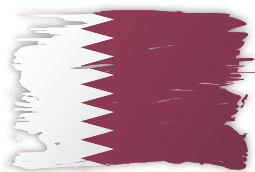

France's Golden Legacy: Handball's Greatest Champions

France is the most successful team in the history of the World Handball Championship, having won 12 medals, including six golds. This record will remain unchallenged after the 2025 World Championship, as Sweden and Romania trail with four titles each.

France's dominance began in 1993, when they won their first medal, a silver, after losing to Russia in the final (19:28). They captured their first gold two years later in Iceland, defeating Croatia (23:19) in the final. This golden generation, coached by Daniel Costantini, included legends like Gaudin, Martini, Volle, Kervadec, Richardson, Anquetil, and Stoecklin. From 2001 onwards, France has missed the semifinals at the World Championship only once—in 2013 in Spain. Under Costantini, France claimed gold in 2001, with a team led by Omeyer, Dinart, Fernandez, the Gille brothers, Narcisse, Girault, and Abati. Claude Onesta succeeded Costantini in 2008, leading

France to two Olympic golds, three World titles, and three European crowns. Under his guidance, France simultaneously held the European, World, and Olympic titles, with stars like the Karabatić brothers, Abalo, Sorhaindo, and Guigou. Onesta's final major success was at the 2016 Rio Olympics, after which Didier Dinart took over, winning World gold in 2017. This era introduced new stars like Remili, Mahe, N'Guessan, Fabregas, and Mem. France has not won World gold since 2017. Although they are reigning European champions, their eighth-place finish as hosts of the Paris Olympics was a disappointment.

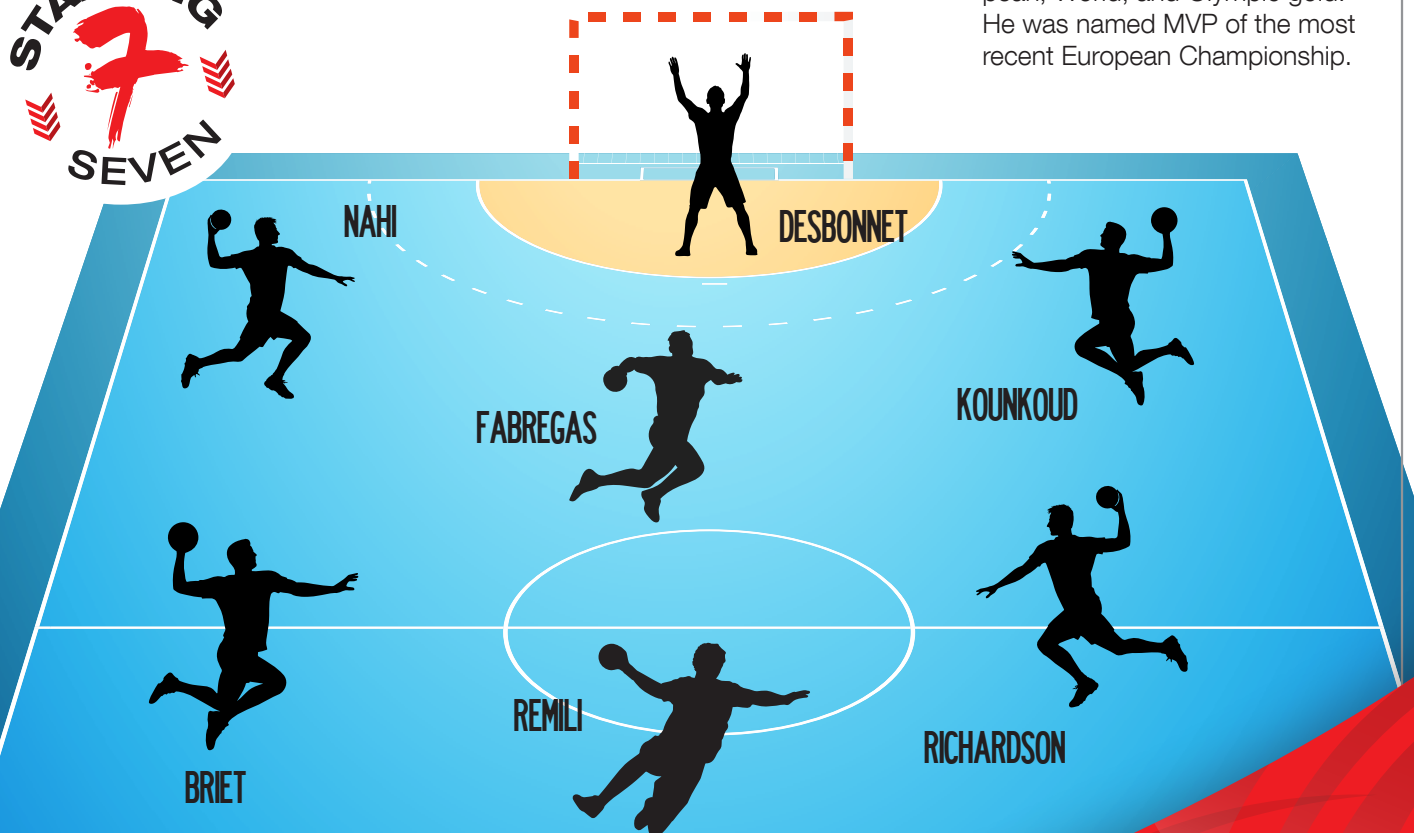

Austria's Handball Revival: Eyes on the Second Round

Austria will compete in their seventh World Championship. Their debut was in 1958, where they finished 11th, still their best result. Notably, only 16 teams participated in that tournament. Austria lost their first match to Yugoslavia (8:35) but secured their first win against Brazil (24:12) in their second appearance.

Austria missed the last World Championship, with their most recent appearance being in 2021 in Egypt, where they finished 26th. They have fared better at the European Championships, achieving 8th place in 2020 and 2024.

Coached by Slovenian Aleš Pajovič, most of Austria's key players compete in Germany's top league. Historically, women's handball took precedence in Austria, with Hypo Niederösterreich winning the Champions League eight

times. The men's team has also seen naturalized players like Janko Božović and Boris Živković. Notably, Ivan Martinić, born in Vienna, chose to represent Croatia instead. Pajovič, a former Ciudad Real and Kiel player, started his coaching career in Graz, where he transitioned from player to coach. Austria aims to advance past the first round of the 2025 World Championship, building on their strong performance at the European Championship. Key players include Nikola Bilyk, Lukas Hutecek, and goalkeeper Constantin Möstl.

Austria qualified for the World Championship by defeating Georgia in the play-offs (27:25 and 37:31).

Aiming High Again: Qatar's Return to the Global Stage

Qatar will participate in their 10th World Championship. Their debut was in 2003, but the team's transformation began when renowned Spanish coach Valero Rivera took charge and Qatar was awarded hosting rights for the 2015 Championship. That year, Qatar assembled a star-studded roster, including Žarko Marković, Hassaan Mabrouk, Rafael Capote, Danijel Šarić, and Goran Stojanović. They won silver after losing to France in the final, their only defeat in the tournament.

Despite regular appearances at the World Championship since 2013, Qatar has not replicated this success. They also competed in the 2016 Rio Olympics, finishing 8th. However, they remain dominant in Asia, winning six consecutive continental titles from 2014 to 2024. While South Korea holds the record for most Asian titles (10), Qatar's recent

dominance places them among the region's elite. Their 10 medals in the Asian Championship are matched by Kuwait, trailing South Korea (14) and Japan (13). Qatar hosted the Asian Championship once in 2004, securing bronze.

Hosting the 2015 World Championship saw the construction of three new arenas. Qatar's performance that year included two players in the All-Star Team—Rafael Capote and Žarko Marković.

As reigning Asian champions, Qatar qualified for the 2025 World Championship by defeating Japan 30:26 in the Asian final held in Bahrain. Led by Veselin Vujović, Qatar's squad includes veterans and new talent, marking their return to the global stage.

From Asian Success to World Stage: Kuwait's Comeback

Kuwait will make their 9th World Championship appearance in 2025. Their debut was in 1982 in Germany, where they finished 15th, their best result to date. Kuwait earned their first win against Algeria in the placement matches. From 1999 to 2009, Kuwait regularly participated in World Championships, though without significant success. Notably, Kuwait has yet to defeat a European team, with their victories primarily coming against teams from Africa, Asia, and South America.

Kuwait's last World Championship appearance was in 2009 in Croatia, marking a 16-year absence. Interestingly, they return to Croatia for the 2025 Championship, with Group C matches hosted at the Žatika Arena in Poreč. Kuwait has also competed in two Olympics: in

Moscow (1980) and Atlanta (1996), finishing 12th both times. They have been more successful in the Asian Championship, where they rank third overall with four golds, including three consecutive titles from 2002 to 2006. Kuwait's most recent Asian medal was a silver in 2008.

Kuwait's handball league has grown stronger, attracting more international players and coaches. Returning to the World Championship as Asia's fourth-place team, Kuwait secured their spot by defeating South Korea in the group stage but lost the bronze medal match to Bahrain. Coached by Algerian Said Hijazi, Kuwait aims to reestablish itself on the global stage.

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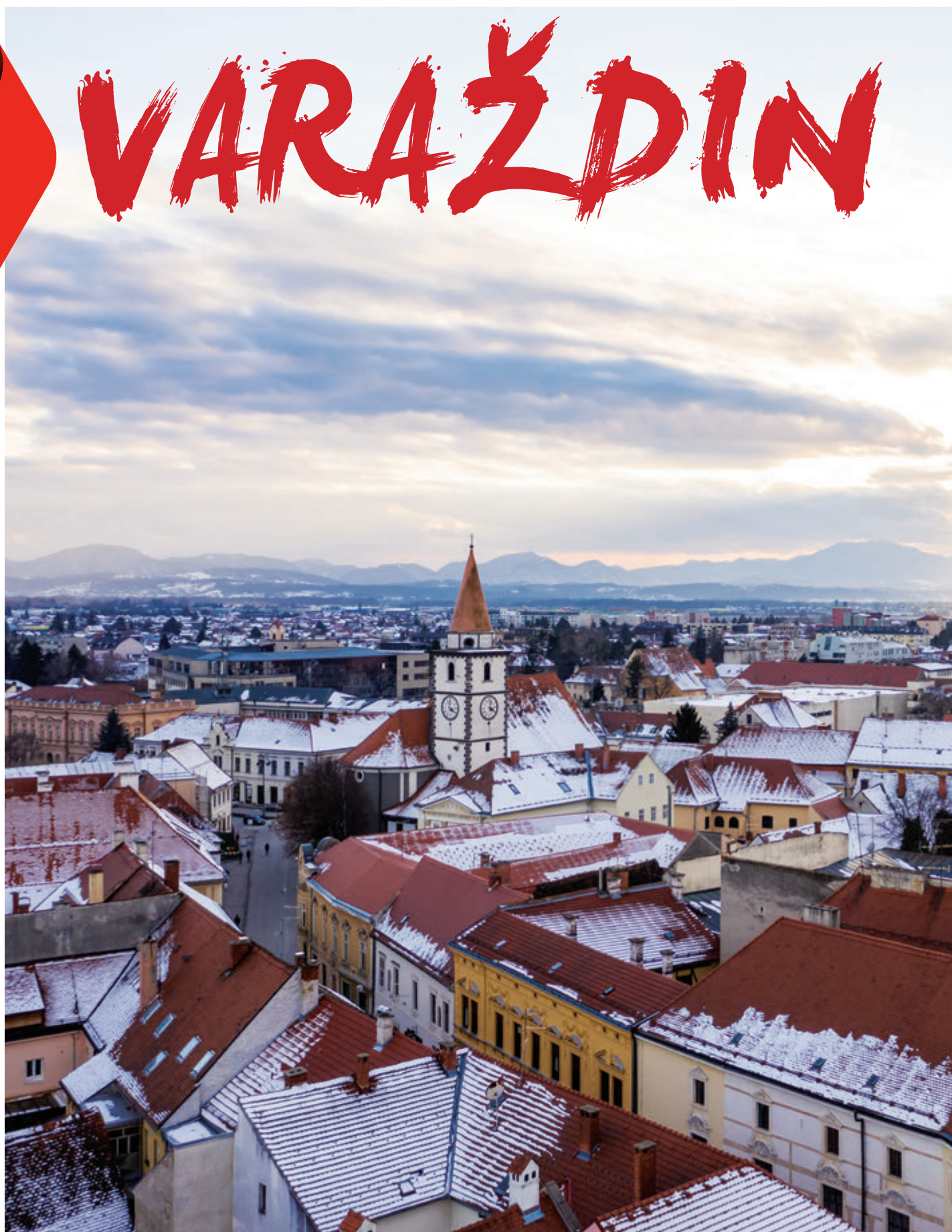

Powerhouse Hungary: Strong Squad, Strong Ambitions

Hungary is participating in the Men's Handball World Championship for the 23rd time. Their greatest success came in 1986 when they won a silver medal at the championship held in Switzerland after losing the final to Yugoslavia. In 1997, Hungary played in another medal match but failed to secure a podium finish in Japan against France.

Hungary has been a consistent presence in major tournaments in recent years. They participated in the Paris Olympics, reached the quarterfinals in the last World Championship in Sweden and Poland, and claimed fifth place in the most recent European Championship in Germany. In the last World Championship, their journey ended in the quarterfinals against Denmark, who went on to win the title.

The Hungarian team, led by Spanish coach Chema Rodríguez, hails from a country with two strong Champions League clubs, Veszprém and PICK Szeged. Rodríguez, a renowned former Spanish international,

previously played for Ciudad Real and Veszprém. After briefly coaching Hungary in 2016, he returned in 2022. The team has made notable progress in youth development, which has positively impacted the senior team. Hungary is a strong contender capable of defeating any opponent and will have a large fan base in Croatia due to their geographical proximity.

During the last European Championship in Germany, Hungary showcased a revamped strategy and performed exceptionally well. With a robust defense anchored by Sipos and Ligetvári, two promising new goalkeepers—Bartucz and Palasics—and standout players like the rapid winger Imre Bence and the exceptionally powerful pivot Bence Banhidi, Hungary has a well-rounded squad. Additionally, Champions League performers such as Bodo (Szeged), Fazekas (Wisla), and Rosta (Dinamo) add further depth.

Dutch Determination: A New Era in Men's Handball

The Netherlands has risen as a new force in European and global handball. Inspired by the success of their women's team, crowned world champions in Japan in 2019, the men's team has climbed the ranks steadily. Head coach Staffan Olsson, a Swedish handball legend, has shaped this team into a formidable unit, led on the court by the talented trio of Baiens, Steins, and Smits, who are now household names among handball fans. Baiens is set to join PSG, Steins is already there, and Smits plays for Flensburg, highlighting the quality within their squad.

This will be the Netherlands' third World Championship appearance and the first time they have qualified for two consecutive tournaments. Including three consecutive European Championships, the Dutch team has become a consistent presence on the international stage. Their rise to prominence in handball, alongside their footballing legacy, was once unimaginable but is now undeniable.

The Netherlands qualified for the World Championship through a challenging playoff against Greece. After losing the first match 31:27 in Kozani, they turned the tables with a 31:25 victory in Eindhoven to secure their spot.

Although the Netherlands lacks a strong domestic league or clubs, their key players compete at the highest level abroad. Luc Steins, the team's linchpin, shines for PSG, while others bring valuable experience from Germany and France. The team, expertly managed by Olsson, also features goalkeeper Ravensbergen, pivot Benghanem, and wingers ten Velde and Schangen. Despite limited squad depth that makes them vulnerable to injuries, the Netherlands remains a dangerous opponent. Ranked 14th globally and 12th in Europe, they are growing stronger and are co-favorites with Hungary in Group D, which will play in Varaždin.

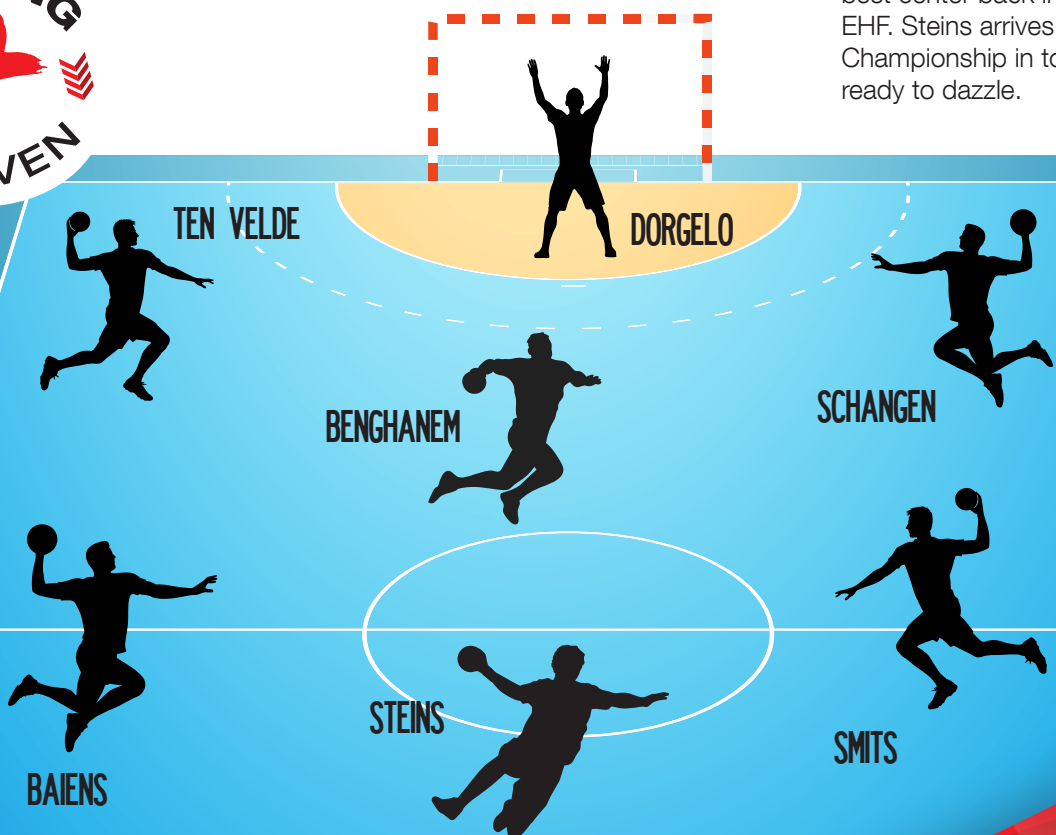

North Macedonia's handball team will make its ninth appearance at the Men's Handball World Championship. Their debut was in 1999, and their best result came in 2015 when they finished ninth in Qatar. The team is now led by Kiro Lazarov, a legendary player and Europe's all-time leading scorer. Following the retirement of a golden generation of players and the decline of once-dominant clubs like Vardar and Metalurg, the team is undergoing a generational transition under Lazarov's leadership.

This transition has not been without challenges. The current squad lacks the resources and conditions enjoyed during Vardar's prime, yet the consistent presence of the Macedonian team in major tournaments offers hope for future success. Veteran players like goalkeeper Mitrevski,

pivot Peševski, and center back Kuzmanovski form the backbone of the team, while emerging talents such as Kostevski, Atanasijević, and Mitev represent the next generation of Macedonian handball.

North Macedonia secured its place in the World Championship after a dramatic playoff against the Faroe Islands. Following a 34:27 loss in Thorshavn, they bounced back with a 34:26 victory in Skopje, advancing by a single goal. The team will play in Varaždin and, as always, will have passionate support from its loyal fan base. While advancing to the next round in a group with Hungary and the Netherlands would be a significant achievement, it remains a challenging goal.

His return coincided with the club reclaiming the national championship, bringing the title back to the south of Macedonia. Kuzmanovski is playing some of the best handball of his career and will be North Macedonia's primary weapon as they aim to advance to the next round.

Guinea's Historic Debut: A Newcomer on the World Stage

The men's handball team of Guinea is making its debut at the World Championship. Their historic qualification was achieved by finishing fifth at the 2024 African Championship in Egypt, their best result to date. Guinea earned this spot by defeating Cameroon and Congo in the group stage, followed by a narrow victory over Angola in a penalty shootout and a decisive win against DR Congo in the placement match.

The Guinea Handball Federation, established in 1972, underwent a major transformation in 2020 by naturalizing 15 players from abroad, primarily from France, along with individuals from Madagascar and Côte d'Ivoire. This strategy, implemented by former coach Kevin Decaux, laid the groundwork for their recent success. The team led by Tunisian coach Brahim Lagha, who achieved

Guinea's best result yet. Lagha, a former goalkeeper for Tunisia with over 100 international caps, has built a team that is a mix of local talent and international experience. Kevin Decaux returned to lead the national team ahead of the World Cup.

Guinea's key players primarily hail from French clubs, including Livry-Gargan, Saint-Raphaël, Montpellier, PSG, Monaco, and Saran. Notable players like winger Pitre, who once played for Porto, add depth to the squad. Despite being a newcomer on the world stage, Guinea's team is well-prepared and will gain invaluable experience playing against top European teams in Group D. Every match will be an opportunity for growth and exposure.

At just 25 years old and standing 203 cm tall, Rubens has an imposing presence on the court. Once regarded as a rising star in French handball, he began his career at Montpellier, training alongside renowned goalkeepers Vincent Gérard and Nikola Portner. Rubens was part of Montpellier's team that won their last European title in Cologne.

Rubens has been described as a "wonder kid" from his early days in Conflans-Sainte-Honorine, near Paris. Interestingly, he started as an outfield player in his youth before transitioning to goalkeeper. Rubens's combination of agility, height, and experience makes him a formidable force and Guinea's most reliable asset at this championship.

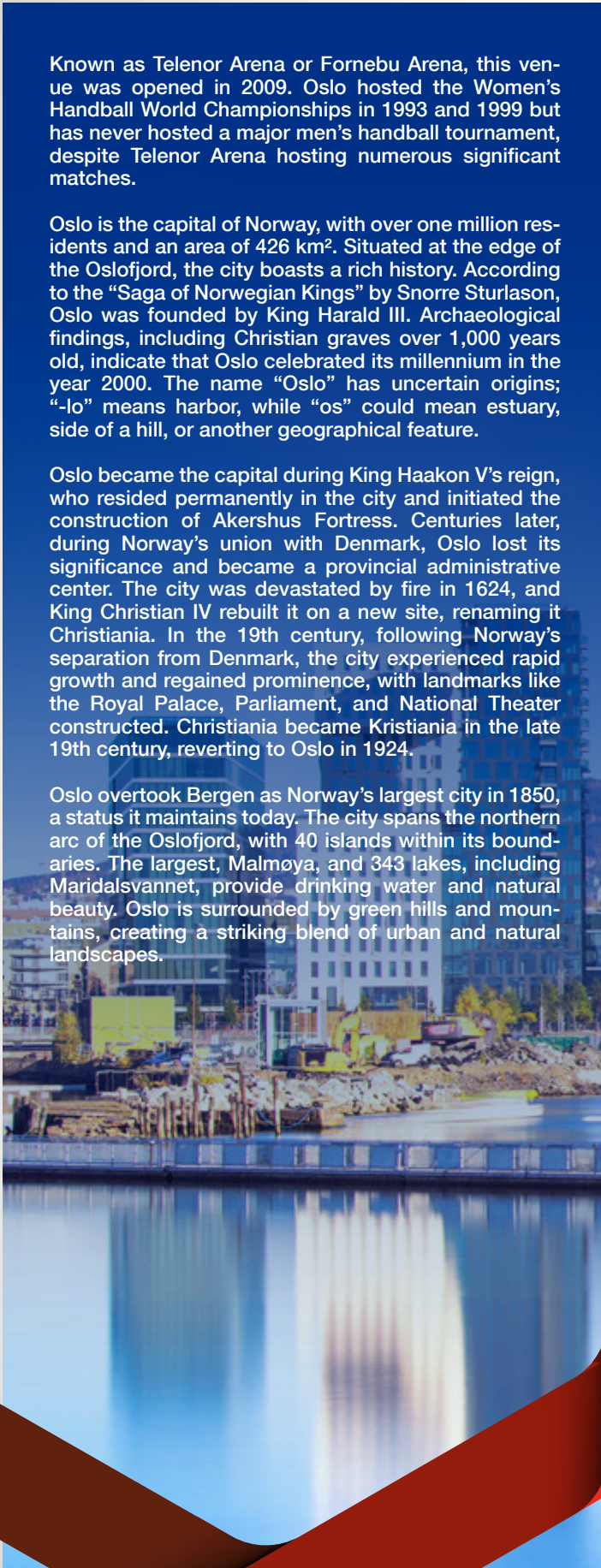


Known as Telenor Arena or Fornebu Arena, this venue was opened in 2009. Oslo hosted the Women's Handball World Championships in 1993 and 1999 but has never hosted a major men's handball tournament, despite Telenor Arena hosting numerous significant matches.

Oslo is the capital of Norway, with over one million residents and an area of 426 km². Situated at the edge of the Oslofjord, the city boasts a rich history. According to the "Saga of Norwegian Kings" by Snorre Sturlason, Oslo was founded by King Harald III. Archaeological findings, including Christian graves over 1,000 years old, indicate that Oslo celebrated its millennium in the year 2000. The name "Oslo" has uncertain origins; "-lo" means harbor, while "os" could mean estuary, side of a hill, or another geographical feature.

Oslo became the capital during King Haakon V's reign, who resided permanently in the city and initiated the construction of Akershus Fortress. Centuries later, during Norway's union with Denmark, Oslo lost its significance and became a provincial administrative center. The city was devastated by fire in 1624, and King Christian IV rebuilt it on a new site, renaming it Christiania. In the 19th century, following Norway's separation from Denmark, the city experienced rapid growth and regained prominence, with landmarks like the Royal Palace, Parliament, and National Theater constructed. Christiania became Kristiania in the late 19th century, reverting to Oslo in 1924.

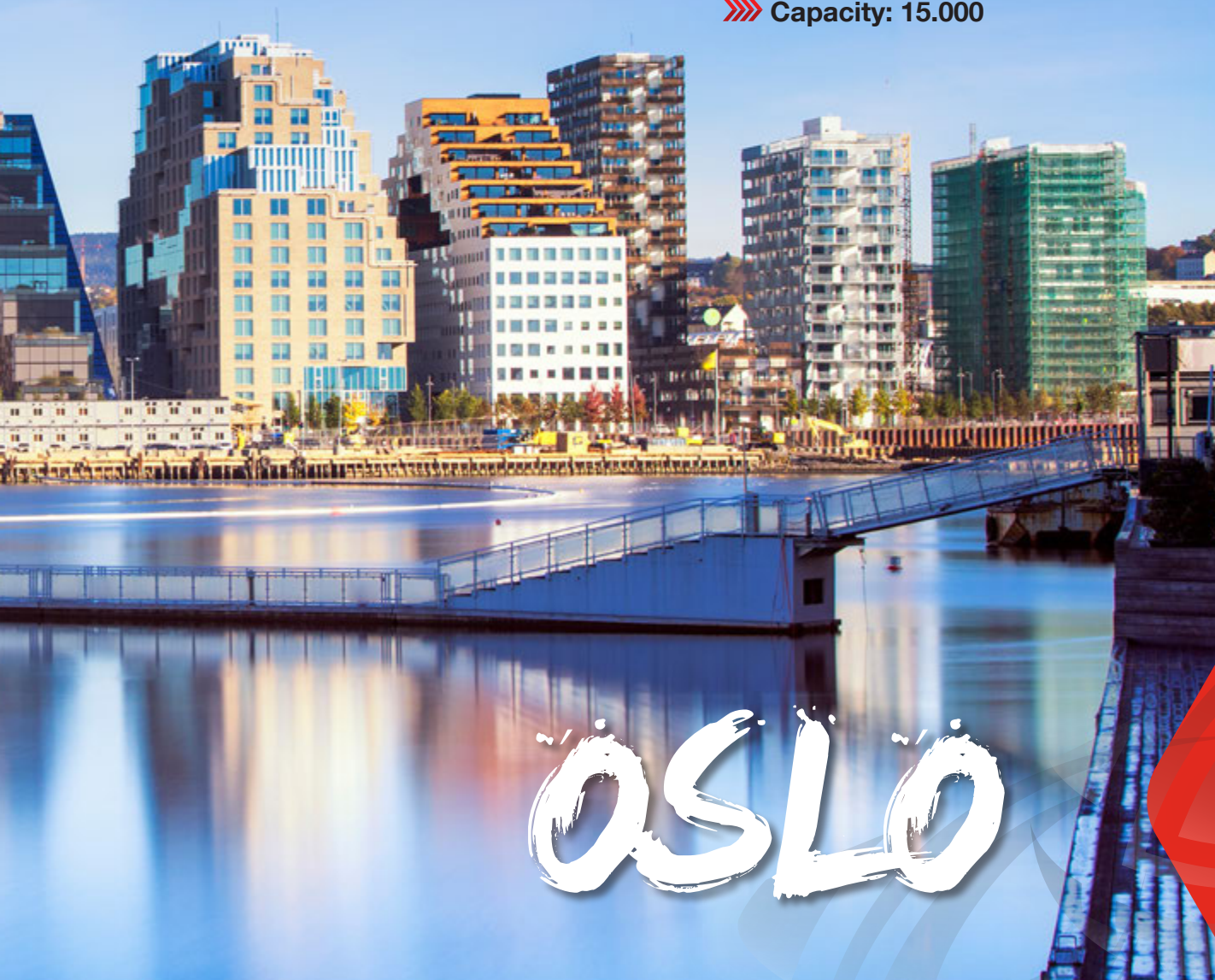
Oslo overtook Bergen as Norway's largest city in 1850, a status it maintains today. The city spans the northern arc of the Oslofjord, with 40 islands within its boundaries. The largest, Malmøya, and 343 lakes, including Maridalsvannet, provide drinking water and natural beauty. Oslo is surrounded by green hills and mountains, creating a striking blend of urban and natural landscapes.

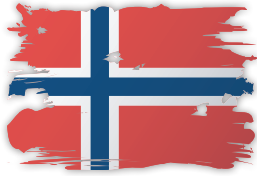

From Transition to Triumph: Norway's Quest at the 2025 World Championship

Norway is one of the co-hosts of the World Championship. By hosting, they secured automatic qualification. They are currently finished fifth in the last WCh, ninth in the EC, and were quarterfinalists at the Paris Olympics. This is their 13th World Championship appearance, where they have achieved two silver medals, most recently in 2017 and 2019.

Norway belongs to the upper tier of European handball quality and has been a regular on the big stage over the past decade. The end of the previous decade marked the most successful era in the history of Norwegian men's handball. However, a generational shift followed, which was not without its difficulties. Alongside this change, head coach Christian Berge was replaced by Jonas Wille.

Myrhol, Jondal, Tangen, and Espen Hansen retired from the national team, making room for new talents led by Sander Sagosen. Sagosen, as a young player, contributed to the best Norwegian team in history. He has grown into one of Europe's top players and is the most important player for Norway today.

Norway's key players compete in Europe's strongest clubs. National champions Kolstad, participating in the Champions League, include Bergerud, Sagosen, Lyse, Sondena, Vetle Aga, and Gullerud. In the Bundesliga, Magdeburg features O'Sullivan, Leipzig has Saeveras, and Reinkind plays for Kiel. Rod wears the jersey of Hungarian powerhouse Szeged, Blonz plays for Denmark's GOG, and Barthold and Bjørnsen represent Aalborg. When all these players come together, they form a very competitive team. However, maintaining good health is crucial, as injuries have plagued the team in recent years, significantly impacting results.

On home soil, Norway is always a favorite. Additionally, it should be noted that the final stages of this World Championship will be played in Oslo, giving the team extra motivation. While they are not at the level of their female counterparts, hosting the World Championship for the first time in history represents a significant challenge for the men's team.

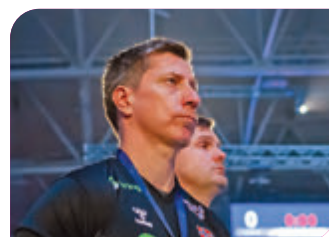

This World Championship will be his 14th major tournament. Sagosen made his debut for the Norwegian national team in 2013. He has been named the best left back at the World Championships in 2017 and 2019.

From Rising Stars to Contenders: Portugal's Journey to the World Stage

Portugal will make their sixth World Championship appearance. Their best result to date is 10th place in Egypt in 2021. At the most recent European Championship, held in Germany, Portugal finished seventh, earning a spot in the playoffs for this World Championship. In the playoffs, they convincingly defeated Bosnia and Herzegovina, winning 29:19 in Guimaraes, with a 26:26 draw in Tuzla.

Portuguese handball has been steadily improving over the past decade. The rise began with the strengthening of clubs rooted in Portuguese football, such as Porto, Benfica, and Sporting. Each of these clubs contributed to the momentum in its own way, but Porto shaped the national team's style the most under Swedish coach Magnus Andersson.

Building on these solid foundations, Paulo Pereira began creating a strong national team, gradually climbing the ranks. At the 2020 European Championship, Portugal eliminated France in the group stage, a pivotal moment

in their progress. Today, they continue their ascent, bolstered by Sporting's new generation of talents like the Costa brothers and Salvador.

Portugal's roster includes key players from domestic and international leagues. Frade plays for Barcelona, Martins for Aalborg, and Cavalcanti for Melsungen. This quality lineup makes Portugal a formidable opponent.

Currently ranked seventh in Europe, their best-ever result was sixth place at the 2020 European Championship in Sweden. Carlos Resende, once a leading player, remains a significant figure in Portuguese handball history, holding records for most goals and appearances for the national team (1,444/250). At the previous World Championship, they finished 13th and were once Olympic participants in Tokyo. Alongside Norway, Portugal is the favorite to win Group E, which will be played in Oslo.

Brazil's Quest for Global Glory in 2025

Brazil is the champion of South and Central America. In 2024, they repeated the title they won in 2022 on home soil, earning a place in the 2025 World Championship. The 2024 Championship was held in Argentina, where Brazil claimed the title with five wins in five games, including a key victory over Argentina (28:26).

Brazil will make their 17th World Championship appearance, with their best result being ninth place at the 2019 tournament in Denmark and Germany. Their highest achievement on the global stage was seventh place at the Rio 2016 Olympics, where they played as hosts.

Brazil's rise began in 2007 when Jordi Ribera, now Spain's national team coach, led the team at the World Championship in Germany. Later, two other Spanish coaches, Javier Garcia and Daniel Gordo, helped establish a strong domestic coaching structure. The team achieved their best results under Washington Nunes, who was succeeded by the current coach, Marcus Ricardo de

Oliveira. This will be Oliveira's third World Championship, with previous finishes of 17th and 18th place.

Most of Brazil's key players are based in Europe, particularly in Spain. Thiagus Petrus dos Santos is a crucial defensive player for Barcelona. Granollers features Guilherme Torriani, a speedy left wing, while Bidasoa boasts pivot Matheus da Silva. Haniel Langaro is with Dinamo Bucharest, and Joao Silva, a center back, recently moved to Serbia's Vojvodina. Additionally, right back Raul Nantes plays for Egypt's Al Ahly, Africa's top club.

This experienced team plays fast, attractive handball while maintaining physical and aggressive defense, making them a challenging opponent for anyone. In this World Championship, Brazil will pose the biggest threat to Norway and Portugal in the battle for advancement to the next round in Oslo.

Born 36 years ago in Ruis de Fora, near Rio de Janeiro, Petrus played for Brazil's top club, Pinheiros, for five years before moving to Spain. Since 2018, he has been with Barcelona, winning the Champions League three times and the Super Globe (the club world championship). In the 2022/23 season, he was named the best defensive player in European handball by the EHF. With Barcelona, Petrus has dominated the Spanish league, claiming 18 titles in six years. He has represented Brazil at two Olympic Games and remains a central figure in the team.

USA Handball: Building Momentum for Los Angeles 2028

The USA received a special invitation to participate in the World Championship from the IHF, as Los Angeles will host the 2028 Olympics, where they qualify automatically as hosts. The team failed to qualify for the 2025 World Championship through the North and Central American Championship held in Mexico, where Cuba won the title. The USA finished fourth, behind Mexico and Greenland.

This will be the USA's eighth World Championship appearance, with their best result being 15th place in 1964. Interestingly, they have participated in six Olympic Games, twice as hosts, achieving their best result with sixth place in 1936.

The team is led by Robert Hedin, a legendary Swedish player from Bengt Johansson's golden generation. Hedin, an Olympic, World, and European medalist as a player, has also coached in Germany and previously led Norway's national team. He has been at the helm of the U.S. team

since 2018, returning them to the World Championship stage in 2023 after a 22-year absence. At the previous tournament in Jönköping, Sweden, the USA secured their first-ever World Championship victory, defeating Morocco 29:28.

Handball has little tradition in the USA and is mostly played by immigrants. In recent years, efforts have been made to stabilize their presence on the global stage. They regularly participate in the Super Globe (the club World Championship), though they have not achieved significant success. Realistically, Group E in Oslo is too strong for them, but they hope to secure a second-ever World Championship victory in the President's Cup. With three and a half years left until Los Angeles 2028, the USA aims to progress and compete with the world's best.

Encouraged by a school coach, Fofana chose handball. Though he has held French citizenship since 2018, he opted to represent the USA to showcase his talent internationally.

Fofana started his professional career with Nancy, followed by stints with Angers, Dutch club Volendam, Villeurbanne, and now Valence. He missed the qualification tournament in Mexico, a significant setback for coach Hedin.

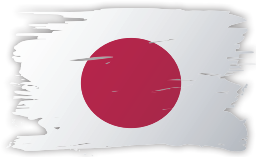

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Consistency and Strength: Sweden's Path to Podium in 2025

Currently ranked third in Europe and fourth globally, Sweden recently competed in the Paris Olympics, securing fourth place. They qualified for this World Championship by finishing fourth in the last European Championship, as the top three earned automatic qualification. Since Denmark, as the reigning world champion, had already secured their place, Sweden's fourth-place finish in Cologne was sufficient for entry. Over the course of the 29 World Championships held so far, Sweden has missed only two editions—in 2007 (Germany) and 2013 (Spain).

Following the Paris Olympics, Sweden experienced a coaching change. Norwegian Glen Solberg stepped down, and the reins were handed to Michael Apelgren, the current coach of Hungary's Szeged, which competes in the Champions League. While the coaching staff has changed, the core group of players remains consistent. This continuity offers Sweden a solid advantage, as their squad comprises experienced and highly skilled players

who are integral members of Europe's strongest clubs.

In goal, Sweden boasts a dynamic duo: veteran Andre-as Palicka and rising talent Thobias Thulin. The team is led by exceptional playmakers Jim Gottfridsson and Felix Claar, with the latter recovering from an injury that could potentially hinder Sweden's campaign if he is unable to participate. The team's hallmark 6-0 defense remains their cornerstone, anchored by standout players such as Jonathan Carlsbogard (Barcelona's left back) and Max Darj (Füchse Berlin). This robust defense, coupled with outstanding goalkeeping, strengthens their wing play.

However, the absence of Jerry Tolbring on the left wing is a significant loss. Nevertheless, Hampus Wanne, who plays for Barcelona, is a capable replacement. Sweden remains a formidable force in international handball, showcasing unparalleled consistency and quality.

The 33-year-old began his career in his hometown of Ystad and made his national team debut in 2012. Since 2013, he has donned the Flensburg jersey, where he won the Champions League in his first season. His career highlights include being crowned MVP of the Bundesliga in 2021, and earning recognition as the best playmaker at the 2021 World Championship in Egypt, where Sweden secured silver. That same year, he finished as the runner-up in the World Handball Player of the Year vote, just behind Denmark's Niklas Landin. He is the true successor to Sweden's legendary generation led by Bengt Johansson.

Tactical Excellence: Spain's New Generation Eyes World Glory

Spain arrives at its 23rd World Championship, having endured an uncharacteristically difficult qualification. Despite their reputation, they were eliminated in the first round of the European Championship in Germany, a rare setback for a team that came into the tournament as reigning silver medalists. Forced into the playoffs, they faced a tough opponent in Serbia. A narrow one-goal aggregate victory—32:28 at home and a 22:25 loss in Novi Sad—secured their ticket to the tournament.

Spain is a two-time world champion and has been a mainstay in the World Championship since 1974. Known for their distinctive style, Spanish handball is often emulated, and their coaching expertise is regarded as the best

in Europe. A new generation of talent has emerged from this system, recently crowned junior European champions and previously winning cadet world and European titles. These accomplishments lay a strong foundation for Spain's future, even as key players like Joan Cañellas, Jorge Maqueda, and Gonzalo Pérez de Vargas approach the twilight of their careers.

Led by Jordi Ribera since 2016, Spain's methodical and tactical approach remains their greatest strength. Ribera's calm demeanor and systematic coaching ensure they remain one of the most tactically sound teams in the world.

Japan's Dynamic Rise: Blending Speed with Strategy

Japan is making its 17th appearance at the World Championship. Their best result to date remains a 10th-place finish in 1970 in France. Absent from the previous World Championship, they did participate in the Paris Olympics, where they finished 11th. Although they failed to reach the quarterfinals and did not earn a single point, they ranked above Argentina due to a better goal difference.

Japan secured their place in this World Championship by finishing second at the Asian Championship in Bahrain. They lost 24:30 to Qatar in the final but left notable teams like Bahrain, Kuwait, Korea, and Iran behind in the standings.

Japanese handball has been heavily influenced by European coaching expertise. After six transformative years under Dagur Sigurdsson, who guided them to the Paris Olympics, the team briefly had Carlos Ortega, Barcelona's current coach, at the helm. Now led by Span-

ish tactician Tony Gerona, a former Serbia national team coach, Japan continues to play a modern, fast-paced game. Sigurdsson's tenure established the foundation for this dynamic style, and Gerona's goal is to lead Japan to a third consecutive Olympic appearance, this time in Los Angeles.

Speed and aggressiveness are the hallmarks of Japan's game, though they can also be their greatest challenge, as maintaining control over such intensity is difficult. Gerona's task will be to balance these traits and refine the team's tactical discipline.

Japan enters the World Championship without two key players: Yatsushira, who was previously the engine of their play, and pivot Yoshida, who plays for French club Nantes. The only player on the roster currently competing outside of Japan is left-handed Tokuda, who plays in Qatar.

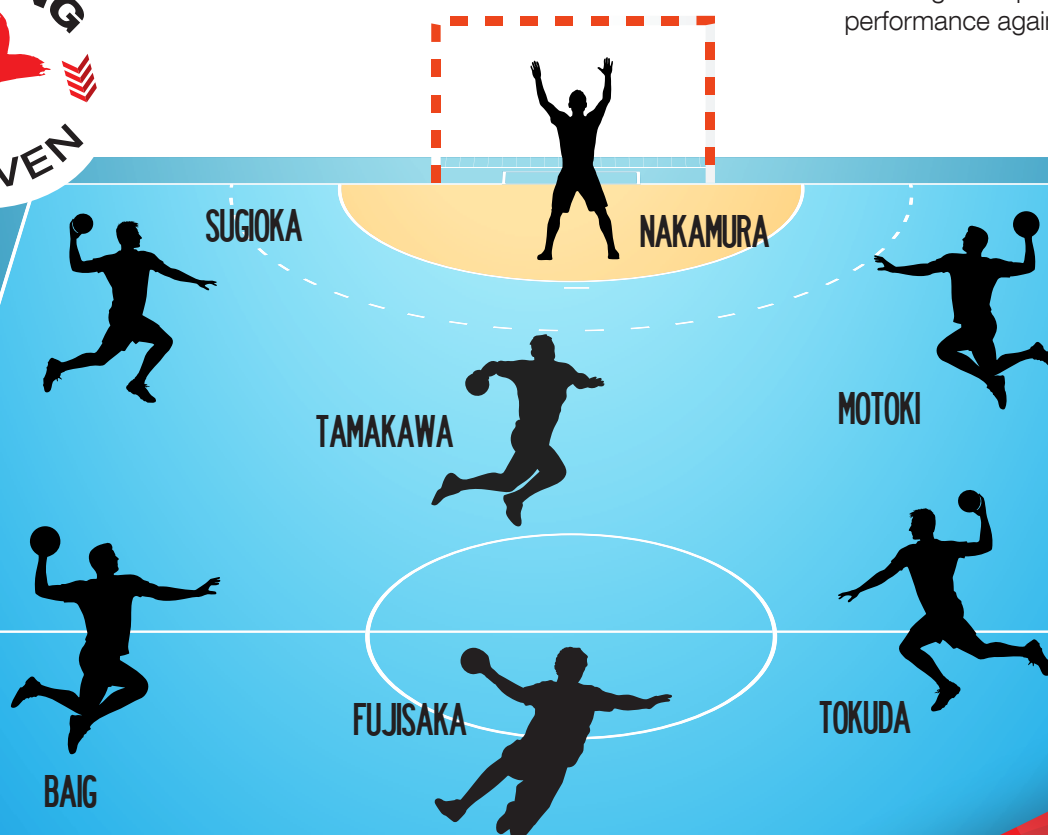

Fujisaka's handball idol is Croatian player Luka Cindrić. Notably, Fujisaka, as one of Japan's youngest players at the Paris Olympics, scored 25 goals, including an impressive 7-goal performance against Spain.

Chile's Handball Ascent: A Generation Defining an Era

Chile earned a spot in the 2025 World Championship by clinching bronze at the South and Central America Championship, held in Buenos Aires. They accumulated seven points across five matches, matching second-place Argentina but finishing behind due to goal difference. Brazil claimed the title.

This marks Chile's eighth appearance at the World Championship. Their best performance remains a 16th-place finish in 2019. Chile debuted at the World Championship in 2011 in Sweden and has since been a consistent participant, solidifying their position alongside Brazil and Argentina as leaders of South American handball.

Chile's rise began under Mateo Garralda, a former Spanish national team star, who coached the squad for

six years. Following his departure, the team remained under Spanish influence, with legendary pivot Aitor Etxaburu now at the helm. Known for his playing days with Irun's Bidasoa, a former Champions League finalist, Etxaburu has shaped Chile into a physically strong and disciplined team. Key players include Esteban Salinas, a 12-year veteran of the Spanish league; the Feutchmann Erwin and Rodrigo Salinas, a standout left-hander also active in Spain.

This generation, widely considered Chile's best, has left an indelible mark on South American handball. However, the challenge remains to nurture successors to ensure their continued presence on the world stage.

Erwin, the 35-year-old leader of the Chilean team, hails from Punta Arenas. A left back with a rich career, he has played for numerous European clubs, including Puertollano, Aranda, Ademar León, and Toulouse. With a towering 190 cm frame, Erwin has consistently been Chile's top scorer, earning accolades at the 2019 Pan American Championship in Lima and the 2022 South and Central America Championship in Recife. His presence was instrumental in Chile's qualification for the 2025 World Championship.



Arena Zagreb

The arena was opened specifically for the 2009 Men's Handball World Championship. It also hosted the Women's Euro 2014 and the Men's Euro 2018. It serves as the home court for Zagreb's Champions League matches.

Zagreb is the capital and largest city of Croatia. As the country's capital, it holds a special territorial, administrative, and self-governing status. The wider metropolitan area is home to over a million residents.

Historically, Zagreb grew from two settlements on neighboring hills, Gradec and Kaptol, which now form the historical center (Upper Town and part of Lower Town). The city is situated on the southwestern edge of the Pannonian Plain, at an average altitude of 122 meters, at the southern slopes of Medvednica, on both the left and right banks of the Sava River. Zagreb's location, where Alpine, Dinaric, Adriatic, and Pannonian regions converge, has made it a bridge between Central Europe and the Adriatic. It is the only capital city in the world that begins with the letter Z.

Alongside Vienna, it is one of the few European capitals with its own wine road, opened in 2009. It is also the only European capital with a ski resort.

As Croatia's largest city, Zagreb is the cultural, scientific, economic, and administrative center of the

Republic of Croatia and the surrounding county. It is also the seat of the Archdiocese of Zagreb. Thanks to its role as the country's main transportation hub, its long-standing industrial tradition, and its scientific and research institutions, Zagreb is the most economically developed city in Croatia. Its favorable geographic position places it at the crossroads of routes between Central and Southeastern Europe and the Adriatic Sea.

Zagreb has a temperate continental climate. Summers are hot and dry, with average temperatures of 20°C, while winters are cold, with average temperatures of 1°C. The city's key industries include the production of electrical appliances, chemicals, pharmaceuticals, textiles, and food. Public transportation in Zagreb includes a network of trams, buses, suburban trains, and taxis, primarily operated by the Zagreb Electric Tram (ZET).

Strength and Strategy: Slovenia's Quest for World Championship Success

Slovenia is making its 11th appearance at the World Championship in men's handball. They placed sixth at the last European Championship in Germany, earning a spot in the play-offs for the 2025 World Championship. In a dramatic two-leg playoff, Slovenia edged out Switzerland. After losing at home (26:27), they claimed a 34:33 victory in the return leg in Winterthur, advancing only after a tense penalty shootout.

Slovenia's greatest achievement came at the 2017 World Championship in France, where they won bronze under coach Veselin Vujović by defeating Croatia in the third-place match. At the last World Championship, they finished 10th, were 6th at the last European Championship, and reached the semifinals at the Paris Olympics, although they missed out on a medal after losing to Spain.

Led by coach Uroš Zorman, now in his third year, Slovenia remains one of Europe's top teams. They have two defining features. First, their game revolves around three standout

players who operate at the highest level of global handball: Blaž Janc, Domen Makuc, and Aleks Vlah. This trio adds a unique flair to their style of play. Second, Slovenia performs at its best only when at full strength, which means having their defensive core—Mačkovšek, Blagotiček, and Gaber—fully available. These three, alongside their goalkeepers, form the backbone of Zorman's squad.

Slovenia is a rising team with improving results in recent years. Playing on what will essentially feel like home turf in Zagreb, Croatia, they are expected to enjoy strong support from their fans. In a group that includes Iceland, Slovenia is the top favorite, making their head-to-head clash a pivotal encounter. The critical factor for Slovenia is staying fully fit, as they lack a deep roster, and any missing players significantly impact their performance.

Janc played in his first Olympics in Rio de Janeiro before turning 20. Now in his 14th Champions League season, he holds a personal record of 77 goals from his days at Celje.

Wearing number 8 for the national team and number 18 for his club, Janc is a fierce competitor and an exceptional attacker.

A New Era for Iceland: Talent and Tradition in 2025

Iceland qualified for the World Championship with a commanding playoff victory over Estonia. They dominated both matches, winning the first leg 50:25 in Reykjavik and the second 37:24 in Tallinn. This will be their 23rd World Championship appearance, with their debut dating back to 1958 in East Germany. Their best result remains a fifth-place finish in Japan in 1997. They did not qualify for the Paris Olympics and are currently ranked 12th globally and 10th in Europe.

Iceland's greatest successes came under Gudmundur Gudmundsson, who led them to an Olympic silver medal in Beijing and a bronze medal at the European Championship in Austria two years later. Iceland's longevity as a top handball nation is remarkable given the country's small size and limited resources. Their enduring presence at the highest level is a testament to a well-developed and continuously innovative system.

Now coached by former playmaker Snorri Gudjonsson, this will be his first World Championship as head coach. He debuted with a 10th-place finish at the European Championship in Germany.

Iceland's game is characterized by speed, but not in the typical Scandinavian style. Their approach also emphasizes control and strong defense. With Gudmundsson's departure, they are forming a new team, largely composed of players from the world's top leagues. Key figures include goalkeeper Viktor Hallgrímsson, wings Gudjonsson and Elísson, and backcourt players like Gisli Kristjánsson, Aron Pálmársson, Viggo Sigurðsson. This combination of talent ensures that Iceland remains a dangerous opponent in any tournament.

The son of former Icelandic handball great Kristjan Arason and Iceland's Minister of Education, Katrin Gunnarsdottir, Kristjansson began his career in Hafnarfjörður, spent two years with Kiel, and joined Magdeburg in 2020. With Magdeburg, he reached the European summit, earning MVP honors at the final tournament. He debuted for the national team before turning 18.

Kristjansson has won the Super Globe twice with Magdeburg, was named the best player in the German Bundesliga in 2022/23, and has already collected three Bundesliga titles, two European League championships, and a Champions League trophy. In 2023, he was named Iceland's Sportsman of the Year.

Cuba's Handball Comeback: Returning to the World Stage After 16 Year

Cuba is a country with a rich handball tradition, having produced many exceptional players who have achieved great success in Europe. Among them, legendary shooter Julian Duranona still holds the record for the most appearances (270) in the national jersey and later represented Iceland. Rolando Urios Fonseca, a brilliant pivot, went on to play for Spain, while Carlo Perez and Ivo Diaz represented Hungary. The late goalkeeper Vladimir Rivero also played for Spain, while Frankis Carol and Rafael Capote now represent Qatar.

Cuba is the champion of North America and the Caribbean, earning a spot in the 2025 World Championship. They won the tournament held in Mexico with a perfect record of six victories, culminating in a dominant 36:21 win over Mexico in the final.

This marks Cuba's eighth participation in the World Championship, returning after a 16-year absence since their last appearance in 2009, which was also held in Croatia. Their best result came in 1999 in Egypt, where they placed 8th, with Rolando Urios leading the scoring charts

with 57 goals. Cuba has also competed in the Olympics twice, in Moscow '80 and Sydney '00.

The team is led by 40-year-old coach Jover Jorge Hernandez Miranda. Their biggest challenge is assembling the full squad, which often determines their competitiveness on the world stage. This makes it difficult to predict how well they will fare against group favorites Iceland and Slovenia. Cuba's core players are based in Europe. For example, shooters Hanser Rodriguez, Angel Rivero, and Ronaldo Almeida play for Vardar (Macedonia), La Rioja (Spain), and Ivry (France), respectively. Left wing Frank Cordies represents Spain's Huesca, goalkeepers Adan Martinez plays in Croatia (Čakovec), while the 202 cm tall and physically imposing Magnol Suarez guards the net for Mallorca in Spain. Pivot Eduardo Valiente competes for Spain's Romo. Cuba consistently produces outstanding handball talents, but their performance heavily depends on the composition of their roster.

Standing at 191 cm, Rodriguez is known for his explosive athleticism and represents the continuation of Cuba's tradition of producing powerful players. This season, he has been showcasing his skills with Vardar in the European League.

Cape Verde's Handball Rise: A New Force in Africa

Cape Verde's handball team is the fourth-best in Africa. At the last African Championship in Egypt, they reached the semifinals but missed out on a medal. They lost to Algeria in the semis (26:32) and to Tunisia in the bronze-medal match (28:35). However, their fourth-place finish was enough to secure qualification for their third consecutive World Championship. In 2023, they achieved their best result, finishing 23rd globally, improving upon their 32nd-place debut in 2021 in Egypt, where they were forced to withdraw due to COVID-19. Their silver medal from the 2022 African Championship, where they lost to Egypt in the final, remains their greatest achievement in handball history.

The mastermind behind these achievements is Serbian coach Ljubomir Obradović, who has led the team since 2021. Obradović, an experienced coach with a storied career in Serbia, Montenegro, and Portugal, took over

a national team that had never competed on the global stage. Drawing from players competing in Europe and complementing them with domestic talent, Obradović built a team that has become a rising force in African handball. Cape Verde caught global attention at the last World Championship by defeating Uruguay and advancing to the second round. The new coach is Jorge Rito.

Cape Verde's top players hail from strong Portuguese clubs. Notably, pivot Paolo Moreno, named Africa's best circle runner, plays for Benfica, where teammate Leandro Semedo also shines. Left wing Gil Pina represents Belenenses, while pivot Bruno Landim plays for Vitória, and right back Marcelino Andrade competes for Varzim. This team comprises players who grew up in a European handball environment, giving them an edge on the international stage.

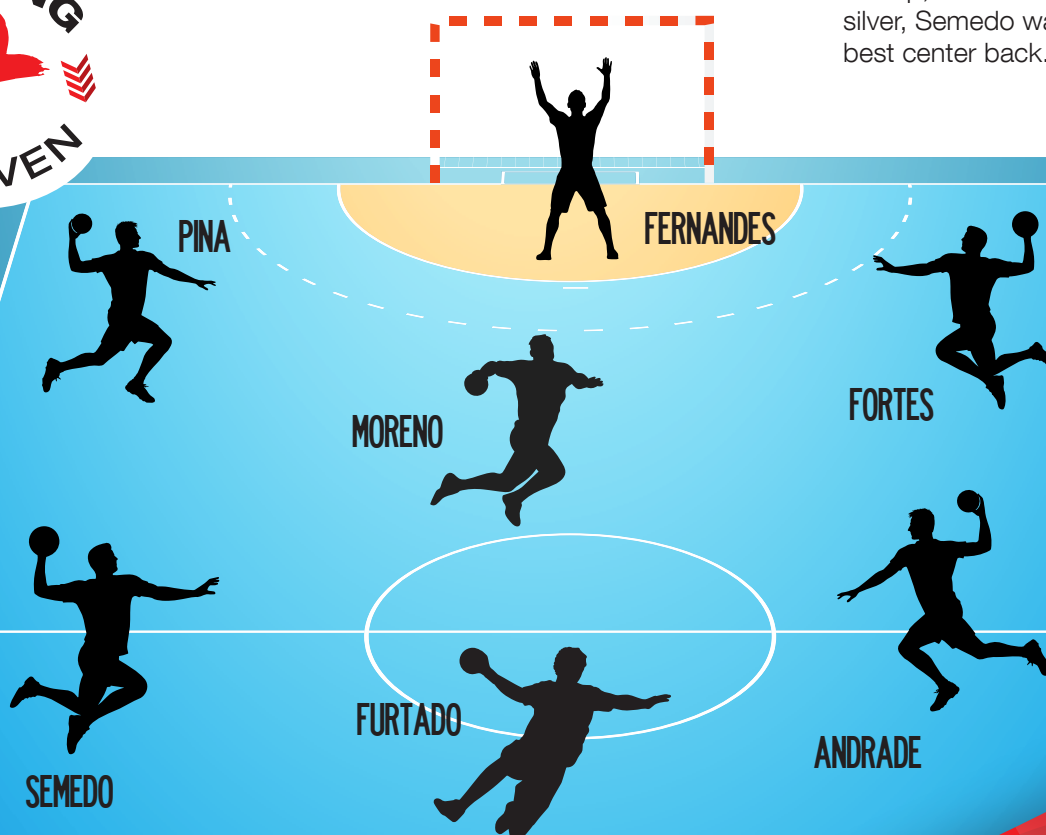


Leandro Semedo Elias Borges Silva, a 29-year-old from Praia, is Cape Verde's standout player. In 2014, at age 20, he moved to Portugal, spending six years with Porto before stints in Spain with Anaitasuna and Ademar León. He returned to Portugal in 2022, joining Benfica, and now plays for Kuwait SC.

Semedo, a left back known for his exceptional jumping ability, stands out despite being only 192 cm tall for his position. He debuted for the national team in 2021 against Hungary. Remarkably, that was Cape Verde's only match in that tournament, as they withdrew due to COVID-19. Semedo gained attention for his strong criticism of the IHF's handling of the situation.

At the 2022 African Championship, where Cape Verde won silver, Semedo was named the best center back.

How demanding is the handball schedule year after year? Last year included the Olympics on top of everything, which is a lot of games and not easy to endure.

Every player in the German Bundesliga knows it's not easy to endure an entire season. This is now my seventh season in Germany, so I know what to expect. You need to take full advantage of club resources like physiotherapists, treatments, nutrition plans, and personalized programs for your body.

Our third match is against Egypt, and we have unfinished business with them from the last World Championship. I believe that will be a big motivation for us to finish first in the group this time. In the second round, we'll likely face Slovenia and Iceland. We want to show that we are the better team, especially in front of our home crowd.

From African Supremacy to World Ambitions: Egypt's 2025 Campaign

Egypt is the reigning champion of Africa and, as such, secured its place in the 2025 World Championship. The tournament, where they clinched gold, was held in Egypt, with the host team winning all six matches. In the final, they comfortably defeated Algeria 29:21.

This marks Egypt's 18th appearance in the World Championship. Their best achievement came in 2001 when they finished fourth in France, becoming the first African team to reach the semifinals. They came close to a world medal again at the 2020 Tokyo Olympics, finishing fourth. Egypt has been crowned African champions nine times and has won the African Games eight times.

With Serbian coach Zoran Živković, Egypt achieved its greatest World Championship result. Under Croatian coach Irfan Smajlagić, they competed in the Beijing Olympics. The era of Spanish coaches began with David Davis and Roberto García Parrondo and now continues

with Juan Carlos Pastor, who led Spain to the 2005 World Championship title.

This is an extremely powerful and strong team, ranked 7th in the last World Championship and 5th in the recent Paris Olympics. Egypt's strength lies in its mix of domestic stars from clubs like Al Ahly (coached by Danish tactician Madsen and featuring players like El Masry, Adel, and Abdou) and Zamalek (with El Wakil, Yosri, and Tarek) and elite players in top European clubs. Among them are the brilliant shooters Yahia Omar (PSG) and Ahmed Hesham (Montpellier), winger Mohammad Sanad (Nîmes), and Yehia Elderaa (Veszprém). Goalkeeper Abdelrahman Aly shines in Benfica, while Ali Zein has had spells with Barcelona and Bucharest. This is a well-constructed team, following the Spanish system that has brought them recent success.

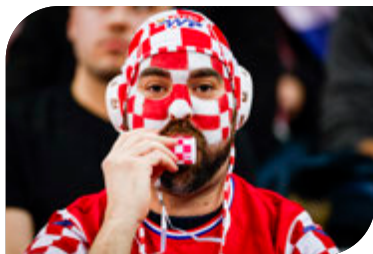

Croatia's Handball Heritage: Hosting Glory in 2025

Since its independence, the team has participated in every European and World Championship to date. This marks their 16th appearance in the World Championship, with their greatest success coming in 2003 in Portugal. That year, under the guidance of Lino Červar and a golden generation of players including Balić, Metličić, Lacković, Džomba, Kaleb, Dominiković, Vori, Šola, and Losert, Croatia won the world title. Alongside their two Olympic golds from Atlanta '96 and Athens '04, this stands as the pinnacle of Croatian handball history.

Croatia's last medal was won at the 2020 European Championship in Sweden, where they secured silver. Since then, they have been absent from the podium.

Following the conclusion of the previous European Championship, Icelandic coach Dagur Sigurdsson replaced Goran Perkovac as head coach. Sigurdsson, who led Germany to the European Championship title in 2016, had spent many years coaching in Japan before taking the helm of Croatia. He made an excellent start in the Paris Olympics qualifiers

but fell short of the ultimate goal. This World Championship, hosted on home soil, presents a significant challenge.

Young players are gradually maturing and stepping into key roles in the national team. This process, while necessary, has been accompanied by growing pains. To ease the transition, the team relies on experienced veterans, led by long-time captain Domagoj Duvnjak. One critical area yet to be solidified is defense, traditionally Croatia's strongest asset. The departures of defensive stalwarts Jakov Gogun and Željko Musa have left gaps that need addressing. Sigurdsson has a talented squad at his disposal, including an exceptional young goalkeeping duo in Kuzmanović and Mandić, attacking stars like Ivan Martinović and Mario Šoštarić, and a playmaking maestro in Luka Cindrić, who represents Veszprém, one of Europe's top handball clubs. Translating this potential into results will be the ultimate test for Sigurdsson and his team.

Martinović debuted for Croatia in 2019 during a friendly match against Germany in Hannover. Martinović is a leader of the new generation of Croatian handball players, a group eagerly awaiting a breakthrough on the global stage. His speed and ability to score goals with ease are truly impressive.

New Era, Same Spirit: Argentina's Quest for Success in 2025

Argentina is the second-strongest team in South America after Brazil and enters the World Championship in that capacity. This marks their 15th consecutive appearance in the tournament since their debut in Japan in 1997.

Argentina has consistently been a part of the international stage, including the Olympic Games, where they first competed in London in 2012. Currently ranked 19th globally based on their last championship finish, they placed 12th in the most recent Olympic Games. Their best result in the World Championship came in 2021, when they finished 11th in Egypt. One of their most memorable moments was a victory over Croatia at the 2003 World Championship in Portugal, the same tournament Croatia went on to win.

Legendary pivot Gonzalo Carou holds the record for most appearances with 204 matches, while right back Federico Pizarro is the all-time leading scorer with 610 goals. After the Paris Olympics, Guillermo Milano was replaced as head coach by Rodolfo Jung, signaling a new era for the team.

Despite this change, Argentina continues to rely on experienced players like 37-year-old Pizarro, goalkeeper Leonel Maciel, playmaker Diego Simonet, and left wing Federico Fernández, all of whom remain key contributors despite being over 35. The emergence of younger talents such as middle backs Bono and Cami, right back Moyano, and left back Parker offers hope for the future. Argentina has also been investing in youth development under Jung's leadership, ensuring a steady pipeline of talent. Diego Simonet's performance is questionable.

The primary goal for Argentina in this World Championship is to advance to the second round, a task made challenging by their inclusion in a group with Egypt and Croatia. Although the team's age may pose difficulties in a long tournament, Argentina is capable of up-setting any opponent in a single match.

Handball has its own Leo. He is Leo Maciel, a goalkeeper who is currently the most renowned player in a significantly rejuvenated Argentina squad. Maciel is 36 years old and the oldest member of today's Argentine team, having made his first World Championship appearance in 2019.

He started his career in Argentina, wearing the jersey of local clubs Dorrego and SAG. At the age of 21, he ventured to Spain, where he built the majority of his career. Over four years at the small club, he built such a reputation that he was signed by the biggest name in the sport—Barcelona. His strong performances led him to his first stint outside Spain, with Sporting Lisbon, and at the beginning of this season, he returned to Spain to play for Bidasoa in Irún. Quick and not particularly tall, Maciel is a goalkeeper who reads the game and players exceptionally well.

From Tokyo to the World: Bahrain's Handball Ascent

Bahrain is Asia's third-best team, earning a spot in the 2025 World Championship by hosting and excelling in the Asian Championship. This marks Bahrain's sixth appearance in the World Championship, though it would have been their seventh had they not been disqualified from the 2015 edition in Qatar despite qualifying. Their best performance was a 16th-place finish at the 2023 World Championship in Sweden and Poland.

Bahrain's most significant achievement on the world stage was qualifying for the Tokyo Olympics, where they reached the quarterfinals and finished in 8th place.

The team is coached by Aron Kristjansson, a former Icelandic national player with extensive coaching experience. He has worked in Denmark (with clubs like Skjern, Kolding, and Aalborg), Germany (Hannover), and led Iceland for four years. Kristjansson has been at Bahrain's helm since 2018, with a brief interlude when fellow Ice-

lander Gudmundur Gudmundsson temporarily took over. His Icelandic roots heavily influence Bahrain's playing style, making them a unique team in their region. Unlike other Gulf teams that rely on naturalized players, Bahrain's roster is composed entirely of homegrown talent, making their accomplishments even more remarkable.

The team captain, Husain Al-Sayyad, boasts an astonishing record of 449 matches and 1,133 goals for Bahrain. While seasoned veterans like Al-Sayyad continue to lead, the team is also introducing promising young players such as playmaker Mohamed Mohamed and dynamic right wing Ahmed Jalal. Bahrain proved their mettle during the Tokyo Olympic qualifiers in Qatar, defeating the host nation in the semifinals and Korea in the final to secure their Olympic debut.

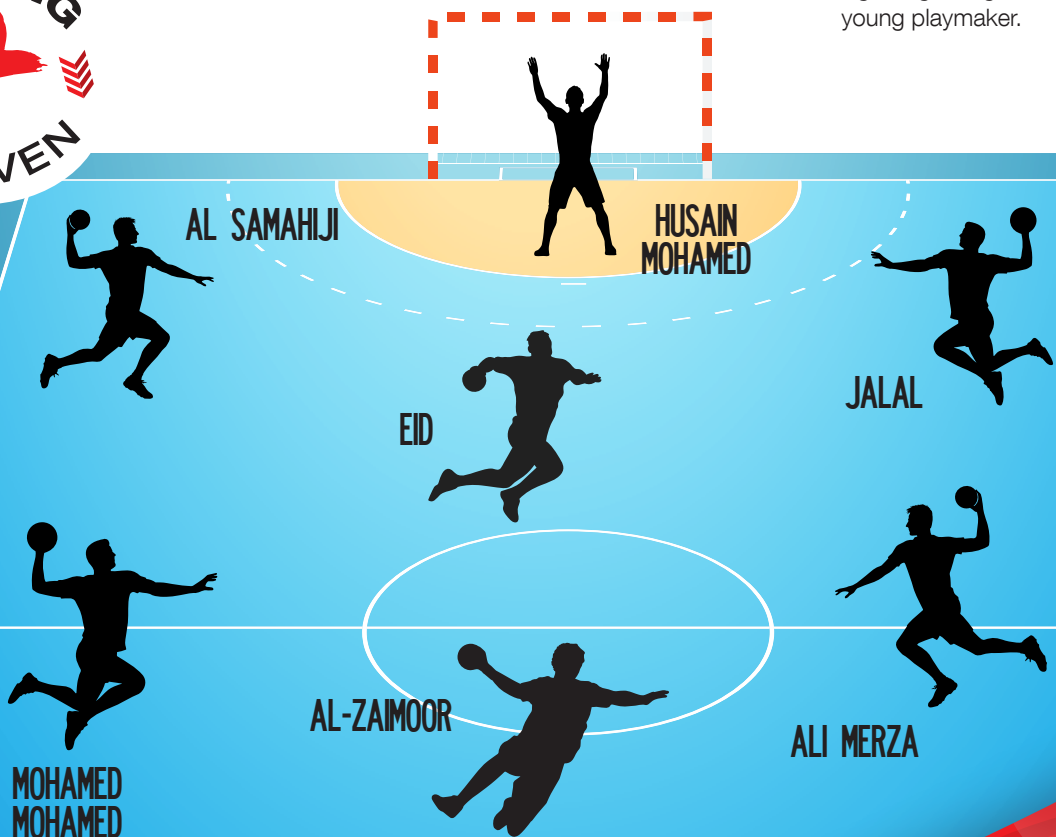
»»» **Mohamed Mohamed**



Full name Mohamed Habib Naser Mohamed, this 23-year-old center back represents Bahrain's next generation of handball stars. A member of Al-Najma in Manama, Mohamed debuted at the Tokyo Olympics, where Bahrain achieved their best result to date. Despite being under 20 at the time, Kristjansson recognized his potential and entrusted him with significant responsibility.

Mohamed is exceptionally quick, effective, and fearless. Wearing jersey number 95, he has already earned nearly 10 caps for Bahrain's national team and has two medals to his name—a silver from the 2022 Saudi Arabian Championship and a bronze from Bahrain's home tournament in 2023.

At the 2023 World Championship, Mohamed scored 26 goals in six matches, marking an impressive debut. Alongside captain Al-Sayyad, he was one of Bahrain's top scorers, signaling a bright future for the young playmaker.

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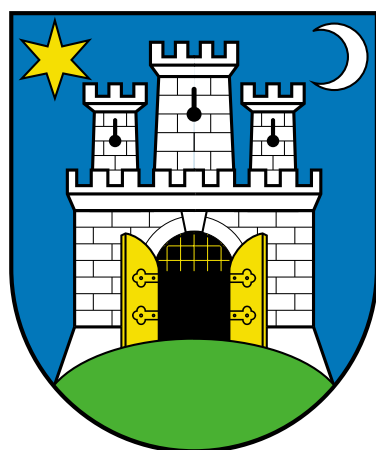

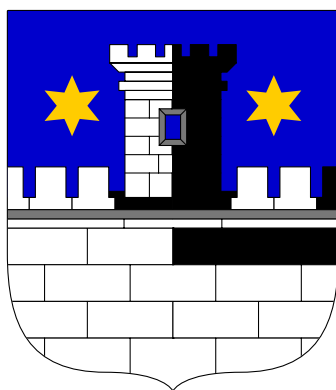

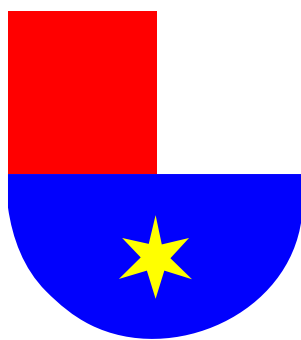
